
### Different types of journals



Size. A6, A5, A4, Square, A4 & A3 I would call a sketch book Orientation. Portrait, landscape, Square.

**Types of paper.** White, off white, greys, creams, cappuccino. **Weight of paper.** Writing, Sketching, ink, watercolour 300g **What's on the paper.** Plane, lined, dots, grid, mixed.

Paper edge. Straight, Deckled edge.



Study of multiple subjects

Travel sketches (page per day or location) Animals, landscapes.

Study of a single subject

Trees, stumps, bugs, Flowers, petals, cars, frogs.

## Why sketch in a journal?

Something to can keep, not to sell.

Memories (Travel journal)

It's quick, compact, mobile (Journal + Pen or pencil) Always on hand.

Relax after large painting.


#### NOTES!


If your worried about the first page then start a few pages in.

Sign every page or double page.







### **Reference Images**

Sometimes you need to change elements in your reference image to create a better sketch.

This could include adding or removing elements entirely. Even changing the scale of objects and elements to create a better composition or give depth.

Don't just copy, create your own story. Capture the viewers attention, make them think.




